Introduction

Background and Methodology

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- Each spring and fall, Digital Research, Inc. conducts the *Critical Insights on Maine™* tracking survey, a comprehensive, statewide public opinion poll of registered voters that covers a variety of topics of interest to businesses, government agencies, and the general public.
- Critical Insights on MaineTM has been documenting the attitudes, perceptions, and preferences of Maine's residents for more than 25 years, making it the longest-running consistently-administered tracking survey in the Northeast.
 - In addition to general-interest items (the results of which are released to the media in this report), the survey also includes a number of proprietary items for sponsoring entities, with results of those items released only to the sponsors of those specific questions.

Methodology

- All survey respondents were registered voters who live in Maine.
- This wave of the survey included a total of 614 respondents across the state who were surveyed by phone (300 respondents) or online (314 respondents) in October and November of 2023.
 - Final data reflect the demographics of the state's population and were statistically weighted to ensure that those responding by phone or the internet had an equal impact on the overall results.
 - With a total sample of 614 respondents, results presented here have a margin of sampling error of +/- 3.9 percentage points at the 95% confidence level.
- The entire survey took the average participant 20 minutes to complete including both general-interest questions and proprietary subscriber items.



Views Towards the Direction of Maine and the Nation

One-quarter of voters surveyed in the fall of 2023 believe Maine is headed in the *right direction*, holding steady since the spring.


Direction of Maine

Those who believe Maine is on the right track are most likely – by far – to point to the governor as the reason for their positive opinion.

Six out of ten Republicans feel the state is on the wrong track (62%), compared to two out of ten Democrats (22%).


Wrong Track

Well over half of surveyed voters in Maine -63% overall - believe the nation is on the wrong track - a significant increase from last spring, and high above the historical average. Just one out of ten believe the nation as a whole is heading in the right direction.






Financial and economic issues – led by housing affordability – continue to be the most common overall concerns for Mainers. Homelessness and the environment are the only non-economic concerns mentioned by a noteworthy share of surveyed voters overall.

Most Important Issues Facing Maine

Percentage naming each issue (Top Mentions)

> Compared to the spring, Mainers are now more likely to be concerned about affordable housing and homelessness.



Gun control/Gun violence (Before Lewiston events)

In all, 3% of Mainers mention gun control or gun violence as a top-of-mind issue facing Maine.

- Prior to the events in Lewiston on October 25, 1% of Mainers mentioned the issue.*
- After the events in Lewiston, 13% of Mainers mentioned gun control.**

All items mentioned by more than 5% of participants in the fall of 2023 are shown.



When focused on economic issues specifically, the high cost of living generally continues to be the most common concern among Maine voters, followed by the price of oil and other utilities, inflation, and the cost of housing.





Chart shows issues mentioned by more than 5% of respondents in the fall of 2023.



Half of Mainers believe the economy will get worse over the next year, maintaining a level of pessimism seen only during the great recession and the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.






Opinions of Politicians

After a decline since the spring, almost half of voters currently approve of Janet Mills' performance as governor.

Approval of Janet Mills








Roughly four out of ten constituents of Chellie Pingree approve of her performance – holding steady since the spring.

After a significant decline since the spring, one-quarter of Jared Golden's constituents now approve of his performance – the lowest measured across his five years in office.

Approval of Congressional Representatives

(Among those in the respective districts)



Six out of ten Democrats in the first congressional district approve of Chellie Pingree's performance (59%), compared to 17% of Republicans – very consistent with last spring.

Support for Golden has declined dramatically among Democrats since the spring (falling from 63% to 34% between the spring and fall), but has held steady among Republicans (26% approved of his performance in the spring, and 24% approved in the fall).



One-third of voters in Maine approve of the state legislature's performance, holding close to the historical average.

Approval of the State Legislature


Just under half of Democrats in Maine approve of the legislature's performance (45%), compared to one-quarter of Republicans (26%).





Roughly one-third of voters currently approve of the way Susan Collins is handling her job as U.S. Senator – on par with her recent ratings.

Approval of Senator Susan Collins








Four out of ten voters approve of the job Angus King is doing as U.S. Senator, now matching the low last seen in the fall of 2016.




The decline in Senator King's approval rating since the fall of last year has been due to a steady erosion in support among Republicans.

Three out of ten voters in Maine approve of Joe Biden's performance as president. While steady, that remains at the lowest point since his election.




For comparison, over the course of his final two years in office, 38% of Maine voters approved of Donald Trump's performance. When asked in the fall of 2023 to look back over his term, 38% of voters approved of Trump's performance in hindsight.



One-quarter of voters in Maine approve of Kamala Harris's performance as vice president.

Approval of Kamala Harris




Only 5% of Republicans in Maine approve of Kamala Harris's performance, compared to 51% of Democrats.



2024 Voting Intentions

Overall, Joe Biden and Donald Trump would receive almost identical shares of the vote in a 2024 election rematch in Maine, though many voters remain undecided.

Trump Versus Biden Presidential Vote



Predictably, Trump is particularly strong in the second congressional district, and Biden is strongest in the first congressional district.

Voters who do not identify with one of the two major parties are just a divided as others:

34% would vote for Trump and 25% would vote for Biden.




Only three out of ten voters would be satisfied with their choices if Donald Trump and Joe Biden are the parties' nominees.

Satisfaction with Presidential Candidates

Total dissatisfied with Biden/Trump choices: 62%

Democrats (63%) and Republicans (58%) are equally likely to be dissatisfied with their choices in a Biden/Trump rematch.




Total satisfied with Biden/Trump choices: 30%



A strong majority of voters – seven out of ten overall – would support age limits for national candidates.

Support for Age Limits for Elected Officials






Prior to the November 2023 referendum, 28% of surveyed Mainers planned to vote in support of the Pine Tree Power initiative. That is nearly identical to the 30% of voters who actually voted in favor of the ballot question.

Support for a Ballot Initiative "To Create the Pine Tree Power Company, a Nonprofit, Customer-owned Utility"

REFERENDUM QUESTION:

"Do you want to create a new power company governed by an elected board to acquire and operate existing for-profit electricity transmission and distribution facilities in Maine?"



In November of 2023, 30% of voters <u>actually voted in favor</u> of the Pine Tree Power ballot initiative.
